Layouts in 15 Minutes {or Less}

This layout is a quick one that doesn't look like it at all, thanks to using the adorable pre-designed floral sheet of patterned paper in the kit.



Prep:

- 1. Use a 4x4 photo.
- 2. Use "Grateful" paper for the background of your layout.
- 3. Cut in half the "yellow polka dot" cut from Simple Stories the Snap Cuts package.
- 4. Fussy cut one doily from "Stitched Together" paper (only need a portion of the doily)
- 5. Cut 2 pennants strips from "Homemade" & "Beautiful Life" papers.
- 6. Cut a 5 x 4 3/4" from "Heart and Home" paper.

Assemble:

- 1. Adhere photo onto "Heart and Home" paper.
- 2. Tuck both pennant pieces under the right of "Heart and Home" paper.
- 3. Tuck a piece of the doily under the "Beautiful Life" pennant.
- 4. Take both pieces of the "yellow snap cuts" and tuck one under "Heart and Home" paper on left and the other under doily on right.
- 5. Add title, bling flowers, layered sticker and a couple of word stickers and done!

Designer Details {Using White Space}

When you are creating a layout are you afraid of leaving "white space?" I've talked to so many scrapbookers over the years that have a dislike of white space! I've learned to love white space over the years, and I will give you a few of my white space favorites.

First of all, white space does not have to be literally "white." White space is often referred to as negative space. Simply put, it is the portion of the page that is left unmarked. White space is an important element of design which enables a balance between positive and negative space and is the key to aesthetic composition.

While creating with the June Medley this month, I came across this photo of my daughter's accomplishment at her latest swim meet. I simply had one Instagram photo of the event, but it was a very important

event in her life to document. I did not want to crowd a page with something that would take away from the meaning of this moment for her.

A few things I keep in mind when creating a layout with white space:

- 1. Create soft lines. I find with white space it is nice to create soft lines into your focal point (I created the wave edge here to go with the swim theme).
- 2. Create a design triangle for the eyes to follow. Using principles such as using odd numbers of embellishments can help you to create a design with a strong focal point. In my layout, I used three main embellishments to create my design, and with the right angle in the lower right corner, it created a triangular focal point.

Just remember to have fun and try something that may be out of your comfort zone! There is never a right or wrong answer when it comes to scrapbooking!





Scrapbook Shortcuts (One Page Vs. Two)
